Presentation	Ampoule/vial: 4mg/4mL (1:1000)
Dose and Administration	<u>Acute hypotension (adequate blood volume)</u> IV infusion: Refer to anaesthetics
Pregnancy	1st Trimester: Safe to use 2nd Trimester: Safe to use 3rd Trimester: Safe to use
Breastfeeding	Safe to use
Monitoring	Haemodynamic monitoring Close monitoring of arterial and venous pressure and continuous ECG during administration.
